A Situation We Must Address

I am happy to report that our alumni association is getting stronger each and every day. Our undergraduate chapter is comprised of an amazing group of men who are involved in numerous social, scholastic and athletic organizations throughout campus and the community. The chapter has maintained the highest male Greek GPA since recolonization. Our undergraduate numbers are strong, and the chapter works hard to ensure that we recruit and initiate quality members. I encourage every alumnus to stop by the house whenever you have the chance. I am sure you will be as impressed with the undergraduates as I am.

Fortunately, the alumni housing corporation is fiscally stronger than ever. However, our chapter will be facing the financial challenge imposed by the college's Life Safety Initiative, discussed in the article by vice president Mark Trudeau '92 elsewhere in this issue. The Life Safety Initiative is a challenge we must address together. There are other fraternities on campus actually considering selling their chapter houses to the college because they believe they cannot afford the renovations that will be required under the Life Safety Initiative. I wish to make it clear that Lambda Chi Alpha is not one of those chapters: We are not considering turning over the chapter house.

The alumni housing corporation's officers are working very hard to preserve ownership of the chapter house, but we need your help. The housing corporation is currently compiling cost estimates associated with the Life Safety Initiative. I can assure you the costs will be substantial. However, the monetary costs associated with installing fire sprinklers and alarms pale in comparison with the value of an undergraduate member's life. There is no price that can be put on that. Therefore, it is likely fund-raising efforts will commence during the spring. I am confident that, through strong alumni support, we will meet the Life Safety (Continued on Page 3)

Meeting the Challenge of the Life Safety Initiative

When I am back on the campus of Gettysburg College and walk toward 113 West Broadway, I sometimes feel as if 12 years haven't really gone by and everything looks the same to me. But looks can be deceiving.

Things have changed since many of us graduated from Gettysburg, both on campus and in society in general. As many of you know, liability and risk management issues are much



more at the forefront of all aspects of our lives than they were in the past. One way

this is directly impacting the undergraduate brotherhood of Theta Pi Zeta is the college's requirement that, in the not-too-distant future, our chapter comply with their new Life Safety Initiative (LSI).

The LSI is many things but, boiled down, it will require the installation of a modern, stateof-the-art sprinkler and fire alarm system. A review of our existing house layout — as well as of the HVAC, plumbing and electrical systems will also take place. While this will not require renovations as all-encompassing as that which took place in the 1990s, it is a significant undertaking that will require a good deal of time and funding to complete.

The housing corporation, alumni association, general fraternity and undergraduate brotherhood, as well as the college administration, are committed to meeting the challenge of install-(Continued on Page 3)

The Lessons of Impact Leadership

Impact Leadership is Lambda Chi Alpha's premier leadership development program offered to provide the skills necessary to be effective leaders in the fraternity and beyond. I was privileged to graduate from the first three levels and was accepted to participate in Level 4 in Indianapolis over a weekend in February 2004, with the generous monetary and moral support of Theta Pi Zeta behind me.

Level 4 is unlike all other levels, in that the training is no longer in the classroom; rather, it involves a simulation of a fraternity with problems requiring all participants to assume various roles and work together toward a common goal.

My intense experience was everything I was expecting and more. Along with a small group, including five members from different chapters, I became a member and officer of the simulated fraternity Alpha Sigma Delta (ASD) on a hypothetical campus.

We were assigned the primary responsibilities of holding elections among ourselves, formulating a five-year plan, organizing a community service event for all conference participants and having our own brotherhood event, all in the span of less than 36 hours.

The catch was the simulated problems we encountered along the way, including negative press, underage drinking, sexual assault, academic difficulties and the threat of losing our chapter, all derived from real Lambda Chi Alpha chapters' experiences and which required us to step outside our comfort zones and address the problems by dealing with irate administrators and community members. After approximately 27 hours of work in two days with no more than five hours of sleep, the six members of ASD presented a five-year plan to a board of Lambda Chi Alpha staff serving as simulated administrators of our imaginary campus, and who would hear our course of action and determine whether or not our chapter would be closed.

So reads the plaque above the bar at McSorley's Ole Ale House. Recently this New York City landmark turned 150 years old, and the brothers of Lambda Chi Alpha were on hand to celebrate. Realizing a need for more alumni interaction, the housing corporation board of Theta Pi Zeta will be coordinating regional events that alumni can attend to reconnect with other alumni living in the area. The McSorley's outing was the first in what will hopefully be a successful program of reuniting classmates and of meeting brothers from classes different from your own.

Nestled along a quiet street in the East Village, McSorley's hasn't changed much in 150 years. The beer is still served in two varieties — light and dark — and they come two at a time. The walls are adorned with old pictures and yellowing newspapers, giving visitors the impression they're walking through history as they trek across the sawdust-covered floor on their way to the communal tables in the back. In a bar that measures its history in decades, the only additions are that women are now served (courtesy of a 1970 Supreme Court decision) and the No Smoking signs mandated by Mayor Bloomberg. The old coal-burning fireplace still radiates heat, keeping comfortable the cats lying nearby. The bartenders actually remember you, and they carry your group's beers 20 at a time.

The recent festivities began at noon on a Saturday. The brothers in attendance were Sean Harlin '96, Nick Morse '01, Jason Straczewski '01, Jack Nightingale '95, Andrew Congleton '95, Anthony Dolce '98, Bryant Pappas '95, Sean **Basquill '96, Tim Lydon '95** and me. Including brothers, friends, wives and girlfriends, we ensured that we commanded the attention of our faithful server. Everyone had a good time. Conversation topics ranged from politics, to children, to sports, to the civil rights of people detained by police, to unfortunate accidents involving mosquitoes, and more. Even when discussions became heated — as discussions about politics often do in a large group of people from different backgrounds — they were quickly defused with a hilarious comment or a timely transition into an amusing anecdote. By the end of the evening, we all parted as the best of friends and were already talking about our next outing.

Speaking for myself, outings such as this are what unite us as a brotherhood. We all come from different backgrounds, are at different stages in our lives, and may not have even been at Gettysburg during the same time as the other people who were sitting around the table with us. However, the brotherhood that united us in college still binds us today. Regardless of which years you were there, who doesn't have a story involving cooking late at night in the kitchen, Secret Santa or hanging out in the basement when XYZ happened? These are the types of experiences that bring us together as a brotherhood, and the types of memories we are trying to rekindle.
