

Richard Krause '89 on Lambda Chi Bonds, Getting Pinned on His Wedding Day, and the Friendships that Last a Lifetime

Thank you to **Richard Krause '89** for participating in this Q&A...

What is your favorite Lambda Chi tradition? Why?

There are so many that it's difficult to narrow it down! I really enjoyed being a part of the ritual, and I still remember how we practiced very hard to make it perfect. Another tradition I think back on is the Steppenwolf song "Magic Carpet Ride!" Brothers would gather in a circle, jump up and down, and sing this song at the top of our lungs. We even did it at my wedding!

What do you miss most about living in Gettysburg?

When I was there, I remember saying that the best view of Gettysburg was through the rear view mirror as I was leaving! It's funny how time has changed my opinion on things. As a history major, I always loved the battlefield. I also enjoyed the campus architecture and landscaping. I remember taking walks across campus and listening to the bells of Glatfelter Hall and the Seminary Chapel. I also loved the openness of the area—especially a new snowfall and the green of the spring. I think back to living in the house and the closeness that I had with some of my fraternity brothers and how—even to this day—I still enjoy those friendships. How can any Lambda Chi brother from my time not include the "High Roller" (**Mike Mahalage**) as a memory? What a character he was!
