#### A Q&A with the man who organized our 100th-anniversary party

Brother Robert Blomberg '76 was an instrumental part of the planning committee that made the 100th-anniversary celebration a success last fall. Robert recently answered a series of questions about organizing the big event.

## What exactly did the 100th-anniversary weekend entail?

RB: Fran Cannon led a committee which involved brothers from many different decades and which worked hard to prepare for the weekend. The committee had dozens of conference calls to plan all details of the weekend. We relied heavily on alumni support from Gettysburg College – in particular College Alumni Director Joe Lynch, Joe's staff, and Joe Guerreri '08 from the Gettysburg College staff. They were instrumental and were a tremendous help to all of us and the committee.

We had many events scheduled throughout the weekend. While we dealt with heavy rain all weekend, it didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the returning Lambda Chi brothers and their families.

We kicked it off with a golf event on Friday afternoon where we had 36 golfers.

We had a Friday evening social event at the Gettysburg College Alumni House. Well over 130 brothers and their spouses attended.

On Saturday, we had a lunch which had the largest returning number of brothers and their families – more than 400 attended. In the late afternoon, we had a dedication



of mental chairs to brothers no longer can get with us; we also had the opportunity for a group photo as well as photos by class and/or by decade.

Saturday night's dinner for almost 200 included former U.S. Presidential Candidate Ron Paul '57 and Lambda Chi National President Bill Farkas.

RB: What was great was that we had brothers return from classes in the 1950 through the 2010's. Most of the people from classes where I had overlap (1973-1979) I had seen in prior reunions. Do you think you laid the groundwork for making the alumni association even stronger down the road? In what ways?

RB: The focus on the weekend was celebrating our 100 Years of Brotherhood at Lambda Chi. While tours of the current Lambda Chi house occurred and many memories were shared, the focus was more on the past with the anticipation that the past will drive the future direction for the house.

## Why does Lambda Chi Alpha continue to be so important to you?

RB: The Gettysburg chapter of Lambda Chi was a huge part of my college years and the friendships which began there continue through today. It was also an important driver in influencing the person I am today.

#### **Brother Harry Fones '15 goes to work for RNC**

The biggest national story of 2016 was the presidential race, and Brother **Harry Fones** '15 was right in the middle of it. Fones, a former member of the Gettysburg College Republicans, works for the Republican National Committee in Washington. The history/political science major is a research analyst.

"If you had told me when I first got to Gettysburg that I would end up working for the RNC, I never would have

believed you," Fones told the Gettysburg College web site. "Now, I get to do what I love. And that's a really neat feeling — to be 23 and to be doing something I love."

Fones attended the annual Conservative Political Action Conference



in Washington while he was an undergrad, where he met Rick Santorum and Newt Gingrich, among others.

"That's where I really started to dip my toe into the political arena," Fones said. "And that's when I really started to get involved." But when Fones wasn't interacting with conservative heavyweights, he was also learning under Gettysburg professors like Don Tannenbaum and Ken Mott.

"No one cared what I thought as long as I could explain

why," Fones said in describing their debates. Two other Gettysburg alums – Liz Oberg '15 and Mia Phillips '16 – work with Fones at the RNC. Fones got an interview when he ran into Oberg on the D.C. metro. "So much of D.C. is being in the right place at the right time," Fones said.

my "advanced age," I was expected to respect the brothers as I did my meal service and other work as a pledge. It was a good learning experience that I carried forward in my life. My experience as a Lambda Chi Alpha brother was a very memorable part of my great four years at Gettysburg College.
